Statement and resources from NACADA related to recent events

NACADA, The Global Community for Academic Advising, values and promotes inclusive practices within the association and the advising profession. Lafayette's Office of Advising is also guided by the values of NACADA and their <u>Pillars of Academic Advising</u>. We wanted to share NACADA's recent statement to members about the troubling and challenging events in our society:

On May 25, 2020, George Floyd died in Minneapolis when a white police officer pressed his knee into Mr. Floyd's neck for 8 minutes and 46 seconds, as he lay face down in the street. George Floyd, in distress, repeated, "I can't breathe. I can't breathe. Mama. I can't breathe." George Floyd's story is not an isolated one. Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, Sean Reed, Tony *McDade – black lives taken. We understand these lives are only the most recent lost; those we know about. Many more remain undocumented, unseen by us.*

As members of the NACADA community, we condemn the acts of racism and hate that have taken the lives of our brothers, sisters, mothers, fathers, friends.

History is pierced by atrocities of racism and xenophobia, and the history of the United States is riddled with acts of racism and brutality against indigenous people and people of color murder, enslavement, lynching, segregation. These are transgressions that cannot be undone. Some may want to believe that we have moved past these cruelties, but each act of violence reminds us that we have not.

Our societies are unjust, and the persistent displays of that injustice bear down on our hearts and minds. We see our members hurting; our students hurting. They are angry that acts of racism and brutality continue without repercussion. They are frustrated at displays of solidarity without actions that create and sustain change. They are frightened to go jogging alone, to leave their homes at night, of being falsely accused or situations escalating because of the color of their skin. For many, the anxiety and fear are palpable.

We understand that each member of our NACADA and campus communities have different needs at different times and places. We want to create spaces for people to feel heard, supported, and loved, and spaces for people to learn to be better allies. We urge you to not lose hope or believe we are powerless to demand and create change. Each of us can take action now – in NACADA, in our institutions, and in our local communities.

NACADA recognizes the value and power of diversity among our members and the students who entrust us with their educational experiences. We know full inclusion and engagement is the ideal we have not yet reached, and we are taking continual steps to do better. As an advising community, we must come together from all our different institutions, different roles, and different places of understanding and desire to be better and through our unifying work create a better association so we can better serve our students who need us.

As each of us continues to process the death of George Floyd and other acts of violence stemming from systemic racism, we hope you will reach out to one another, share your feelings and experiences, engage in healing activities, and actively participate in antiracism and community building efforts in our institutions and communities. In-Person to Online Tutoring in 10 days: Honoring Hub Peer Educators

The announcement in early March of the pending move to remote education left just 10 days for the Academic Resource Hub to transition the existing in-person support, to remote delivery of <u>Supplemental Instruction</u>, Mentored Study Groups and One-One tutoring.

Following a 'crash course' on the basics of a variety of Remote Learning Tools provided by Lafayette's Tech Training Coordinator - **Greta Bergstresser**, a team of 59 SI Leaders, MSG Leaders, and Peer Tutors, began remote sessions on March 23rd.

Students enrolled in some of our historically most challenging gateway STEM courses were relieved to find that 100% of Supplemental Instruction and Mentored Study Group sessions continued, ultimately offering over 500 group sessions and 56 one-one tutor sessions. In maintaining support and connection with our support team during the remote learning period, the Hub staff met individually with 28 leader/tutors and held 6 hours of online group meetings.

Adaptive, flexible and creative are just a few words that describe the Hub Peer Educators who rose to the challenge of supporting their peers and helping to maintain student engagement in their courses. And like other teaching professionals, they navigated shared spaces at home, were flexible with time zone changes, adapted sessions for course delivery changes, and supported their families with additional job responsibilities. In addition to all of these demands, many continued to work towards fulfilling the requirements to become a certified tutor. In fact, a few were even able to complete the process of earning <u>CRLA Peer Tutor Level</u>

<u>1 certification</u>! Congratulations to *Dorothy Barney, Erica Beatson, Betsenat Gebrewold, Hannah Greaves, Benny Molina-Olivia.*

It should come as no surprise that Hub Peer Tutors and SI Leaders are successful in the classroom, but with 65 honors and scholarships, including three finalists for the Pepper Prize, awarded to graduating Hub Staff Members, it will be hard not to miss the influence they have had on the learning of their peers! 94 students inducted into Lafayette's 2nd Tri-Alpha class!

We are pleased to announce that 94 students accepted induction into <u>Alpha Alpha Alpha</u> (Tri-Alpha) for the '19-'20 academic year. Due to COVID-19, our April induction ceremony was canceled, but these new inductees will be receiving a certificate and pin soon. 24 new inductees are from the Class of 2020; 35 new inductees are from the Class of 2021; and 35 new inductees are from the Class of 2022. Students qualify for induction into Tri-Alpha based on the following criteria:

- The student has earned at least 36 credit/semester hours (or 54 quarter hours) towards a baccalaureate degree
- The student has achieved an overall GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale
- Neither of the student's parents, nor step-parents, nor legal guardians, completed a bachelor's degree

<u>Tri-Alpha</u> was founded on March 24th, 2018 at Moravian College in Bethlehem, and since then has inducted undergraduate students, faculty, staff, alumni, and honorary members, recognizing the academic achievements of first-generation college students. Lafayette College was fortunate to receive our charter as the GAMMA chapter in 2019


Seeking standout students!
